	The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting including new members. Observer at the meeting today was: John Fennell – JCA school support The meeting was quorate.	

1:	<b>Minutes and actions from the last meeting (4 October Virtual Meeting – Zoom)</b> <u>Matters arising</u> Page 6, Para 4 – Paper to be presented to Post Meet how many young people are represented by the £5m figure (18-25 young people) for a comparison with mainstream school age children <b>ACTION</b> – by Kathy	
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Page 5 – Para 1, **ACTION** – Patrick Shields said the answer arrived at was that there is still a lack of clarity, however it looks like there is a possibility that the Early Years indicators will be used instead of KS1.

Rob Hitch (RH) said the oversupply of spaces was previously discussed in Forum and that head teachers have seen drops of 20% in admissions in Croydon. Should we be discussing what the strategic approach to this should be across the borough by e.g. by using data.

JR agreed with Rob Hitch and asked if this was something that fell to Denise Bushay (DB).

SD said DB had presented a previous paper (14 June 2021) that talked about the figures in the north and south of the borough. DB is leading in this area and what is being looked at is surpluses based across different parts of the borough and the LA will be in touch with decision makers for new schools.

JR said this was touched upon and the numbers are freely available. He would urge people to do the work, e.g. restructure, changes in PAN etc, earlier rather than later as if not the deficits quickly build up. This subject can be revisited with DB at another meeting in the new year.

RH felt this is such a significant issue that it has to be on every agenda and that we should be looking at how the data has shifted.

JR was in agreement with RH.

Page 5, Para 1 – Live link for London councils to be circulated to Forum members following the meeting – **ACTION**

Page 8, Q3 – DH ...asked how we got into this situation where 2 pupils were placed in Cranleigh at a cost over £100k each...Page 8, A3 – **ACTION** - JR said this was monies owed that was related to those particular students and we were assured by Kathy Roberts that this was a one off payment that should not come back to 'bite us' again in the future.

Q1: DH asked is there a deadline for these applications as the deficit recovery plan would be thrown out again;

A1: JR said it was funds owing, it was not about bidding for a particular fund. The funding request came in late.

A2: Kathy Roberts said this is a historic payment and that placements happen within SEN, so it is not about a cut off or deadline. Any new placements are now being monitored more closely and there is complete records of the LA ongoing financial commitments.

Charles Quaye said there was infighting with the service and the school regarding the payment. The DfE intervened and said a one off payment needs to be paid.

JR pointed out that the £600k due to Harris was for a lot of children.

2:	<p><b>Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) School Block Formula Factors Review</b></p> <p>Charles Quaye (CQ) presented this paper</p> <p>This paper sets out each of the factors that are used in the Croydon local formula, the rate/amounts in the NFF and rates at the midpoint between the two. The DfE, in the near future, is looking to determine what each individual school is entitled to, based on their own characteristics.</p> <p>Table 1 illustrates the provisional funding allocated to the LA for 2022/23 of £286,333.669 showing an increase from last year of £5,020,707.</p> <p>Q1: Jenny Adamson asked if the midpoint is higher in some cases than the NFF;  A1: Jolyon Roberts said the midpoint is not higher but in some cases e.g. last year we paid higher rates than the NFF.</p> <p><b>3.1 – Minimum per pupil funding</b></p> <p>No decision was needed here as these are nationally agreed arrangements.</p> <p><b>3.2 – Age weighted pupil unit (AWPU)</b>  No decision was needed. This rate can only be determined after the LA receives the final allocation once other funding rates have been allocated.</p> <p><b>3.3.1 – Deprivation – IDACI</b></p> <p>This is a compulsory factor made up of free school meals (FSM), free school meals 6 (FSM6) and income deprivation affecting children index (IDACI).</p> <p>Patrick Shields said that because of the work carried out over the last 6/7 years and in keeping with this spirit, Schools Block unanimously decided to recommend, after careful consideration, to keep last year’ rates – Option d. There was a large hit last year on the A &amp; D bands noted in Table 5 and this shifted a lot of things closer to the midpoint.</p> <p>Jolyon Roberts said the general tone from the Schools Block meeting he attended, was that we were allocated money for deprivation and that this was the year to move to the NFF.</p> <p>Dave Harvey chose Option ‘C’ and said IDACI band A is the highest level of deprivation and should be kept the same. He felt bands B, C, D, E and F could be moved to the midpoint.</p>	

Patrick Shields said the implication of choosing Option c would be that the more vulnerable families in band B, C and D would end up losing more money this year. The reason Schools Block chose to keep to last year's rate was so that those families would get access to enhanced support.

Jolyon Roberts said Patrick Shields was right about band A and that is why there was discussion around this at the meeting. There was championing at the meeting of option 'C' and that if we kept to band A, we would be paying above. Therefore, by choosing Option 'C' the IDACI band A would be paid above the NFF while all other bands moved slowly closer to NFF

Q2: Neil Ferrigan asked if deprivation was increasing;

A2: Jolyon Roberts said if fewer children qualify then fewer funds are distributed and visa versa. A strategic decision is made about the banding levels and then when the formula is applied we can see if it will be costing more or less next year.

Jolyon Roberts said School Block was evenly split between Option c and Option d but he does see the advantages of Option c.

### **3.3.2 – Deprivation – FSM**

Patrick Shields said Schools Block agreed to move to the national average rate set in the NFF rate per pupil. Schools Forum agreed.

### **3.4 - Low Prior Attainment (LPA)**

Table 7 illustrates the payments which have applied in previous years.

Jolyon Roberts said Schools Block was in agreement for the monies to be distributed to children that are eligible.

Patrick Shields said there was uncertainty on how the LPA would be defined, but that it looks like they will be using the Early Years outcomes. As we are so close to the national so the feeling was to make that jump now.

Schools Block unanimously agreed to move to the national average rate set in the NFF rate per pupil.

### 3.5 - English as an additional language

This is an optional factor that Croydon has used in the local formula. Table 8 sets out the rates in 2021/22 and proposed rate for 2022/23.

CQ to check the pupil numbers shown as EAL in the APT as they seem to be surprisingly low. **ACTION**

Patrick Shields said Schools Block unanimously agreed to move to the national average rate set in the NFF rate per pupil.

### 3.6 - Looked after children

There is no guided NFF rate and Croydon can set the rate locally. This funding goes directly to the Virtual School who give great accountability.

Q3: Jenny Adamson said the proposed rate has been £500 for a long time. Is this in line with the what the Virtual School need to deliver a service to these young people;

A3: Jolyon Roberts said from the Virtual School paper produced last year, they had some surplus because of unfilled places.

Shelley Davies said the Virtual School work within the envelope and make sure the budget is not overspent. The number of CLA fluctuates significantly and there has not been any request from the them for more money.

Schools Block agree to maintain the existing rates per pupil.

Option a + b

### 3.7 - Lump Sum

Each school received a lump sum of money illustrated in Table 10. Croydon pays above the NFF.

Jolyon Roberts reminded members that in the past when this figure was varied, smaller schools i.e.1 form entry schools received the most impact.

Patrick Shields said Schools Block remembered when the figure was changed a couple of years ago and the catastrophic impact this had. Forum quickly reversed the decision the following year. The unanimous recommendation from Schools Block was to retain the higher rate as per prior years of £140,000 per school – Option c.

### 3.8 – Mobility

The allocation of the mobility fund is for pupils who join a school on a non-standard date. The DfE have developed a new methodology that enables calculation of distribution funds on a formulaic basis. The unique pupil ID is used to track the movement of pupils for the last 3 years. To be eligible for mobility funding a school has to be above the threshold of 6% in the one year.

Patrick Shields said Schools Block felt it was right to move to the national average rate set by the NFF rate per pupil.

### 3.9.1 – Private Finance Initiative – PFI

Jolyon Roberts said the PFI is going to be paused for the moment and at the 23 November 2021 Schools Block meeting the PFI will form a single agenda item. Adam Browne from Oasis will attend this meeting as there were positive changes in that Oasis is requesting less money. The paper will follow onto the 6 December Schools Forum meeting.

Dave Harvey referred to Page 2 of Schools Block minutes which showed the four funding streams to the PFI contract. He did not realise the LA made a contribution to this and to Virgo as well, unlike the change in Lanfranc. Can there be an explanation to this.

Schools Block to provide an explanation of the different funding streams and how they were arrived at - **ACTION**

Patrick Shields said there were two separate papers on the PFI presented at Schools Block. The request is that all the information be brought as one paper to the Schools Block meeting **on 23 November 2021 at 10am in St Mary's School**. Any Schools Forum members can attend.

### 3.10 – Minimum Funding Guarantee - MFG

This is set at the lowest rate. Table 13 exhibits the previous history of the MFG rate.

Jolyon Roberts said over time Schools Forum have done good work in bringing down the MFG from £11,425,730 to just £87,337 last year. He was disappointed though to see that it may potentially go up £101,196 in 2022/23. MFG is there to smooth the effect of Forum's decision but not to protect against the fall in pupil numbers.

There was unanimous agreement to set MFG +0.5%.

### **3.11 - Growth**

The criteria for growth funding for schools was reviewed and approved by Schools Forum on 5 October 2020. The AWPU rates will be applied to the schools who meet the growth criteria.

Table 14 illustrates the growth rate from 2017/18 to the present day.

Schools Forum are requested to note the above.

### **3.12 – Split site factor**

Jolyon Roberts pointed out that Item 3 of the Schools Forum agenda referred to Split site factors. After consideration of the four choices indicated in 3.12.1 it was decided at Schools Block that we stay with the previous methodology of a). He will declare an interest in this as both Pegasus schools are recipients of this funding and abstain.

Rob Hitch will abstain as his school has a split site.

Markie Hayden notified members that the 18% is shown Item 3, Appendix A, Option 1.

Q5: Neil Ferrigan referred to 18% as one of the criteria and wondered how this was calculated;

A5: Jolyon Roberts said this was a benchmark and came from the DfE.

Dave Harvey proposes to move to the midpoint from 35k to 50k and this would cost Forum £200k rather than £140k.

Patrick Shields said Schools Block felt it was good to do a benchmarking exercise. From the tone of the meeting there would not be any objection to go with Dave Harvey's proposal. For the sake of consistency and based on the work done historically Schools Block decided on Option a).

Q6: Jenny Adamson said as the benchmarking exercise is complete, does Croydon have more features in common with Southwark or Sutton. She also pointed out that Option a) was nowhere near the amount of money required to operate a split site school;

A6: CQ said these are LA that the DfE compares Croydon with. He emailed all accountants that represent LA schools and asked if they could divulge how much they were paying. Only five LA came back to him with their figures.

Dave Winters said he was a member of the Schools Block and had participated in the discussion surrounding this issue. He feels it is entirely reasonable, given the statement this morning from Jolyon Roberts who has experience of operating the factor and that the £35k would seem inadequate therefore a move to the £50k is justifiable. He feels that as a borough Croydon is much more like the borough of Sutton. And therefore we might take their figures as the most useful benchmarking.



	<p>Andrew Rendle said Croydon is difficult to benchmark due the dynamics of south and north of borough. He feels were are more aligned to Southwark.</p> <p>Patrick Shields said the recommendation was, for the purpose of ease and transparency, to adopt the £35k and this was not based on any benchmarking on how much it actually cost to run a split site. It has been acknowledged that it will cost a lot more to run these provisions. 4:	<p><b>Update from Schools Forum Work Groups (for information)</b></p> <p><u>Early Years Working Party</u></p> <p>A meeting was held on 28 September 2021. There are a couple of papers that will be presented to the Schools Form meeting in December 2021. There are ongoing issues around the high needs part of the early years. In regards to the funding issues with Crosfield, any setting has a four week notice period for moving of funding. There is a possibility that some parents will not make the change with regards to Crosfield from their new site and my look at locality placements. Early Years is looking to get a temporary lift for the four weeks' notice so the new setting gets funding straight away. This will allow the child to start rather than waiting four weeks and not be in any setting. Look at temporary funding lift for Crosfield families who may need to join a new school and cannot travel to the new venue – Pick up in POST MEET- <b>ACTION</b></p> <p>Jolyon Roberts said Crosfield has a major boiler situation and had to vacate the building and go elsewhere. It will be a reasonably long term arrangement. The minutes of the 12 October 2021 meeting have been discussed through the course of the Schools Forum meeting today. Charles Quaye had reminded the working group that they are responsible for making recommendations for this and can be slightly more directive over what goes into the central block, this work stream will be returned to. Admissions has been discussed in Schools Block before and this will be picked up as an Agenda item going forward. Request for interested members to attend the 23 November 2021 meeting in St Mary's school for the discussion on the PFI which will hopefully be thrashed out.

#### High Needs Working Party

A meeting was held on 22 September 2021 as the October meeting was cancelled. Work covered was around the accountability and scrutiny of late payments, the Beckmead situation and the drive around clarify and openness. Kathy Roberts and Charles Quaye have taken on the suggestions and challenges of who we are paying and what we are doing. Other useful considerations for the work between Schools Forum, High Needs Block and the LA was having greater clarity of the roles of each of the officers within the LA. Kathy Roberts will be producing a schematic and a dictionary of acronyms. Jonathan Driscoll presented work on the data analysis and the SEND data. It would be good to see more finance pulling through on the data. There is a pre-meet this afternoon for the meeting on the 17 November 2021 at 10am in the Council Chambers and colleagues are welcome to attend. He sees the benefits of meeting in person but understands the changing position.

Dave Winters is not a member of the High Needs working group but reads the minutes carefully and the level of scrutiny exercised in Forum applies to High Needs. High Needs has to contend with a factor that applies to LAs throughout the country and that is the end of funding for provision needed. Forum has representatives of professionals, associations, trade union, councillors, LA officers etc and for Forum to put matters right there is a need for a combined effort to press the government for more funding to this sector of education. The NEU has passed a motion that they will be taking to a national conference which will raise this issue.

Charles Quaye commended Rob Veale and High Needs on the excellent work done. There are grant conditions. The plan was reported to cabinet, audit committee and Schools Forum and there was a meeting with the DfE who looked at the figures. The DfE said once the LA get the pupil figures right, they may get to the stage where they will clear the LA overdraft.

Andrew Rendle referred to the 5.2 c) statutory budget responsibility. There a concern around cancellation of transport due to staff shortages. Is there a funding issue with home school transport?

Rob Veale will add SEN transport cancellations as an agenda item to the next meeting - **ACTION**
